





When Art Marries Architecture:

Inside the Upcoming Wedding of Anvesha Kapoor & Kabir Mehra

As monsoon clouds gently gather over Mumbai's skyline, excitement brews across social circles not just because it's wedding season, but because the most anticipated wedding of the year is about

Meet Anvesha Kapoor - ceramic artist, entrepreneur, and the founder of the beloved Jaipur-based design studio Mud & Moonlight. She's known for her hand-glazed dinnerware, linen saris, and sun-drenched Instagram feed. And her fiancé? Kabir Mehra — architect, urban minimalist, and the creative brain behind New Delhi's award-winning firm Atelier Nine. whose bamboo-and-concrete villas in Goa have been featured in AD India and Dezeen.

After nearly five years of building homes (and a life) together, Anvesha and Kabir are finally tying the knot this September - and yes, it promises to be every bit as curated as their creative journey.

The Story: From Studio Mornings to Sunset

The couple met at a design residency in Himachal back in 2018 - Anvesha was sculpting an abstract installation on river erosion; Kabir was sketching treehouse blueprints. "We bonded over chai, terracotta, and our mutual obsession with Bauhaus," Anvesha says with a laugh. A quiet friendship turned into late-night calls and spontaneous trips to Bhuj, Kutch, and beyond.


The Wedding: Raw Elegance Meets Royal Jaipur

The four-day celebration is set to take place at Barwara Fort, an exquisitely restored 14th-century palace near Ranthambore. Think: heritage sandstone walls, billowing organza canopies, and earthy floral arrangements designed by Anvesha herself - wild tuberose, desi gulab, eucalyptus, and neem branches.

The Groom: Modernist Maharaja

Kabir's wedding wardrobe — styled by fashion editor Tara Lakhani — includes an ivory bandhgala with subtle indigo piping and a midnight blue achkan for the reception, tailored by Rajesh Pratap Singh. He's skipping the turban for a handwoven gamcha-inspired stole and plans to carry a leather-bound sketchbook gifted by Anvesha on Day One of their relationship.

The Rituals: Redefined

There will be a sunrise haldi by the stepwell, where guests will wear turneric-hued cotton robes and participate in a quiet cleansing ritual. The pheras will be conducted during Brahma Muhurat, with a Sanskrit scholar and minimal chanting — "not a performance, but a promise," Anvesha says.

The couple has even written their own wedding vows, infused with lines from Neruda, Kabir, and their personal journal entries.



"This won't be your typical big-fat Indian wedding." Kabir insists. "There will be no gold thrones or choreographed sangeets. We're going for soulful, intentional, and intimate."

The guest list? Only 120. A heady mix of artists, architects, close friends, and family — each receiving hand-printed invites on upcycled khadi with custom wax seals. The dress code? Desert Formal — linen kurtas, Banarasi trenches, and embroidered mojris. Sabyasachi and Raw Mango are expected to make multiple appearances.

The Bride: Barefoot Glamour

For the pheras, Anvesha is collaborating with designer Payal Khandwala for a bold ivory silk ensemble with ink-blue block prints and no dupatta. "I want to be able to walk barefoot, hug freely, and not worry about adjusting pleats," she says.

Her mehendi outfit is a hand-dyed kaftan gifted by a Rajasthani artisan, paired with antique silver jewelry from her grandmother's heirloom collection. "I want to celebrate women who created beauty without Instagram," she adds.

Hair? Tousled. Makeup? Dewy. Footwear? Maybe none.



The Food: Farm-to-Fort

Every menu is being co-created with chef Reva D'Souza (of Table Forage) and will feature regional Rajasthani cuisine with a twist: bajra gnocchi, smoked aubergine tartlets, jaggery truffles, and temple-style coconut rice. Sustainability is key — no plastic, no wastage, and every floral arrangement will be composted.




What's Next?

Post-wedding, Anvesha and Kabir will take a slow honeymoon — three months across Morocco, Mexico, and southern Italy, sketching, sculpting, and collecting stories.

But for now, the world waits. Not for a spectacle, but for a celebration of love, design, and quiet beauty — the kind that's more about feeling than flaunting.

As Anvesha puts it, "We're not planning a wedding. We're crafting a memory."

Weddings will be there to bring you every candid moment — from turmeric-tinted mornings to hand-holding vows under moonlight.

From Delays to Destiny


What started as casual messages about flight refunds turned into voice notes, long texts, and a mutual obsession with old-school Bollywood music. "We bonded over Silsila and Jagiit Singh. It was intense, but slow-burning," says Kabir,

Their first proper date was three months later - a walk through Lodhi Art District, followed by chai at a tucked-away cafe. "We didn't even notice it started raining," Anvesha recalls. "We just kept walking."

Their Lives. In Parallel Motion

Over the next two years, their lives moved in parallel lines that constantly converged - morning airport runs, shared playlists, art shows, silent bookshop dates, and weekend cooking experiments (he makes the perfect dal; she can't cook to save her life).

"She never asked me to be someone else," says Kabir. "She just saw who I was before I even did."



The Proposal: Nothing Grand, Everything

There was no drone footage. No flash mob Just a Sunday morning in their pyjamas, sipping filter coffee on the balcony of their Delhi apartment.


"I was wearing his oversized hoodie," Anvesha smiles. "He just looked at me and said. 'So ... should we make this forever?""

Not a Fairytale. Something Better.



Samar Grewal, Mumbai-based stylist and Aisha's college best friend, is rumoured to be wearing a metallic tissue sari by Vaishali S.


Tara Juneja, fashion content creator with over 1.2M followers, will document the entire weekend in archival Manish Arora pieces — a nod to her friendship with the late designer.



Kabir's childhood basketball coach, Dinesh Uncle, is flying in from Pune — because, as Kabir said, "He taught me teamwork before I learned business."

The Industry Who's-Who: Elegant, But Not Flashy Yes, a few power names are in attendance — but make no mistake, they're here for friendship, not photo ops.

Anvesha Arora, founder of the AI beauty-tech platform Lucid, and Anvesha's MIT roommate, will be there with her wife and their 3-month-old twins.

Rohit Bhatnagar, CEO of fintech darling CrediblePay, has been friends with Kabir since their IIM days.

Kavya Sethi, the PR mogul known as 'the woman who can get anyone on a Forbes list', will handle media invites... but won't be giving interviews.


There's no pressure to perform — just be effortlessly expressive. After all, that's what this wedding is about: people who matter, not just people who trend.

As Anvesha puts it, "We didn't want a guest list. We wanted a guest story."






